Teacher Goals

- Lead students in selecting a class service project.
- Guide students through implementing the class service project.

MATERIALS

- Class Service Project Analysis printable
- Student Pledge Card printable
- Scissors
- Crayons and/or pencils
- Camera(s)
- Photo printer or service
- Journal #4 printable
- Computer with internet access and the ability to post photos online
- Miscellaneous art and presentation supplies (see "Share It" below)
- Family Letter #4 printable

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PREPARATION

- Before the lesson, brainstorm a few possible classroom or school service projects in case students need help thinking of them later.
 - If you need help thinking of a project, ask your administrators and co-workers what needs they see.
 - Popular project ideas include:
 - cleaning up the school grounds
 - sorting objects for recycling
 - beautification projects like planting trees or gardens
 - straightening or organizing the library
 - creating artwork for common areas
 - organizing a book, toy, or school supply drive for a classroom or the library
 - reading to younger students (or buddying up with them for other tasks)
- Print a copy of the Class Service Project Analysis for each student.
- Print a copy of the Student Pledge Card for each student.
- Prepare a class display area large enough to display all Student Pledge Cards, such as a bulletin board in the room or a wall display in the hall.
 - Possible titles include "Our Pledge" or "Our Service Project". See "Pledge It" below.
 - Be sure to save room for photos of the project!
 - If your project is one that will make a large visual impact (for instance, if students are painting a wall or planting flowers), snap a "Before" photo now to post alongside an "After" photo later.
- Print a copy of Journal #4 Printable: Class Service Project for each student.
- Customize Family Letter #4 by adding photos or student quotations related to the class service project to the blank space.
 - If you choose quotations (which may print better), mine these from students' Journal #4 entries or their learning artifacts (see "Share It" below).
 - If you are going to post photos of the service project online, also add a hyperlink to the letter.

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After customizing Family Letter #4, print a copy for each student.







Lesson 5 Activities

Plan It

- Remind students of the things they learned in Lessons 1-3 about good deeds, gratitude, and 9/11 Day.
- Tell the class that it is time for them to complete a school service project together.
- Brainstorm possibilities together.
 - Draw a concept web on the board and write "Class Service Project" in the center circle.
 - Have students call out ideas for potential service projects, writing each idea in its own circle connected to the center circle. Try to keep the list between five and eight ideas; combine ideas if they are related.
 - Note: You may wish to pause the lesson here until you have a chance to present the list of options to your administrator for approval.
- Place students in small groups of 4 or more to debate the ideas.
 - Have each group discuss the ideas on the board and work together to choose one idea they find interesting.
 - This is a good opportunity to discuss and practice consensus building. However, if consensus cannot be reached in a group, be prepared to assign an idea.
 - Distribute a copy of the Class Service Project Analysis for each student. Have each group discuss the benefits and challenges of the idea they chose. Each group member should take their own notes on the Class Service Project Analysis.
 - Next, tell students discuss (and record) ways to eliminate or reduce the challenges they wrote down.
 - Be sure to point out that some challenges cannot be eliminated or reduced.
- Discuss each idea as a class.
 - Invite a student from each group to identify and describe the idea they discussed.
 - Have a second student share the benefits the group thought of.
 - Ask a third student to share the challenges.
 - Invite the fourth student to discuss any ways the group thought of to overcome the challenges.
 - When each idea has been discussed, have the class vote by secret ballot.
 - You may wish to hold the vote in a separate session, after you have time to create a ballot form.
 - Or, you can simply have students write their vote down on a piece of scrap paper.
- Announce the results of the vote and praise the students' choice.
 - Once the vote is complete, be sure to secure administrator approval / permission for the project!





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Pledge It

- Distribute a copy of the Student Pledge Card to each student.
- Tell students that this pledge card is similar to one they will be signing for their 9/11 Day projects soon.
- Have students fill in the fields on the cards, assisting as needed.
 - One of the fields asks students to write down what their task is during the service project. If you have not already done so, talk to students about what task(s) each of them is responsible for.
- Have students cut out their cards before adding them to the class display you prepared.

Do It

- Guide students through any necessary preparation for the service project.
 Depending on the project, this may involve any number of the following:
 - making a list of steps necessary to complete the project
 - making a list of supplies
 - gathering needed supplies
 - scheduling the event
- When preparation is complete, lead students through the steps in completing the selected service project.
- Have a parent, volunteer, or even students themselves take photos as you complete the service project.
 - In some cases, you may wish to take photos Before, During, and After to document the impact the project had.
 - Before the "Share It" activity below, print the photos.

Reflect on It

- Show students the photos of your service project.
- Have the class select which photos to add to your display.
- Have students reflect on their experience with the service project by completing Journal #4: Class Service Project.





Share It

- Create an online photo album to share pictures from the service project with students' families.
- Have students create learning artifacts (video, photo, slide deck, written essay, poster, etc.) in a medium of their choice to share their personal stories and experiences about the service project with others.
- Share students' learning artifacts publicly. This might make a nice parent night display, but you can also share students' artifacts online.
- Give each student a copy of the Family Letter #4 printable to share with their family.

Extension Activities

- As the class finishes the service project, consider starting a new service project for the idea with the second most votes (and so on, as time allows).
- Read a book about serving others aloud to students.
